Seat belts are the most effective means of reducing fatalities and serious injuries, and sadly, many adults and children aren't using them. Adults who don't use seat belts may think that their behavior only affects them, but they're wrong. Studies consistently show that there is correlation between adult belt use and child belt use. According to National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), when a driver is buckled, 94 percent of the time children in that vehicle are buckled; but, when a driver is unbuckled, only 30 percent of child passengers are buckled.



This year, your school is participating in the Click-It Club program and your child has pledged to be a Click-It Cadet and always buckle up properly in the car and to make sure everyone in the car is buckled up, too. So parents, when you hear your child say, "Click-It, Mom" or "Click-It, Dad," remember that it is another way of saying, "I love you and I want you to be safe." Learn and Obey the School Bus Laws

- · Slow down.
- Watch for children playing and gathering near bus stops.
- Yellow flashing lights indicate that the bus is preparing to stop, load, or unload children. Motorists should slow down and prepare to stop.
- Red flashing lights and extended stop arms indicate that the bus has stopped, and that children are getting on or off.
 Motorists traveling both directions must stop and wait until the red lights stop flashing, the extended stop sign is withdrawn, and the bus begins moving before they can start driving again.
